Participants will search written, spoken, and signed texts for vague language (VL); participants will devise and perform translations for vague texts; participants will practice interpreting vague texts both consecutively and simultaneously; participants will analyze vague language in consumer interactions and make ethical decisions using critical thinking, including the NAD-RID Code of Professional Conduct and Demand-Control Schema.

This workshop is open to all working interpreters.

Daniel Greene, MA, NIC Master, has been interpreting since 1990 in a wide range of settings including K-12, postsecondary, conference, educational, medical, performing arts, and video interpreting. His passion for elevating the sign language interpreting profession drives him to study lesser-known topics and teach interpreters new ways of thinking and working. He began studying vague language (VL) in 2009, and has been presenting workshops on the subject ever since. He has published a feature article on vague language in the RID Views Spring 2011 edition, and he wrote his master's thesis on vague language in Western Oregon University's Interpreting Studies / Teaching program.
