He began studying vague language (VL) in 2009, and has been presenting workshops on the subject ever since. He published a feature article on vague language in the RID Views Spring 2011 edition, and he wrote his master's thesis on vague language in Western Oregon University's Interpreting Studies / Teaching program.
